Comprehensive Cancer Control Program
Tips for Finding Financial Resources



Learning that you, a family member or a friend has cancer is a very stressful and emotional time. Making decisions and finding resources can seem overwhelming. As a family copes with the cancer diagnosis and treatment, financial concerns can be quite a burden.

We hope this revised guide will help direct people to resources that can provide some financial relief as they battle cancer. Most of the resources listed in this guide are resources available at the national level with local affiliates. The staff at the national numbers listed will work with you to determine resources available in your area. A number of the organizations, including the American Cancer Society, provide patient navigators, who will confidentially gather basic information regarding the patient's circumstances and work with a variety of both local and national resources to find financial relief. Financial resources include, but are not limited to, aid for treatment, drug prescription relief, transportation and utilities.

National and Local Resources

- Offers many cancer programs for patients, families, caregivers and the community. Referrals for financial assistance, medication, equipment and other resources are available. Toll-free number and website provide information 24 hours a day.

- Provides access for people in need of free air transportation to specialized health care facilities or remote destinations due to family, community or national crises.

- Breast and cervical cancer screening and diagnostic program offered at no cost to eligible women. Eligible women are scheduled for screening and diagnostic services with providers in their area. This program also provides Medicaid coverage of treatment and health care to eligible women diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer or pre-cancerous conditions through the BCCP screening program.

- Limited financial assistance for eligible cancer patients seeking help with transportation, home care, child care and pain medication costs. Linking Arms program can provide assistance for breast cancer patients to help with oral medications and lymphedema supply costs.

- This program provides co-payment assistance for pharmaceutical products to insured individuals who are covered by private insurance, employer-sponsored health plan or have Medicare Part D or Medicare Advantage. Household income must be at or within 400% US Federal Poverty guidelines for people residing and receiving treatment in the United States or its territories. Must be U.S. citizen or valid resident alien. Conditions covered include breast, lung, colorectal, pancreatic, head and neck and glioblastoma cancer.

- Offers online and in-person cancer support groups; coping with the cost of care brochure; assistance finding financial aid.

- Charitable organization providing financial assistance to underinsured patients who cannot afford the co-payments for the expensive medications they need. Patient financial eligibility determined by provider. Conditions covered include breast, colon, non-small cell lung cancer and multiple myeloma.

Eligibility based on patient's individual financial, medical and insurance situation. Offers assistance for the following specific conditions: breast cancer; carcinoid tumors and related symptoms; chemotherapy-induced anemia/neutropenia; colorectal cancer; cutaneous T-Cell Lymphoma; head and neck cancers; Hodgkin's Disease; Non-Hodgkin's lymphoma; non-small cell lung cancer and Wilm's tumor.

- Affiliated hospitals, nursing homes and other health care facilities provide a reasonable volume of services to people who cannot afford payment for their hospitalization and make their

services available to all residents in the facility's area.

- Free lodging available to patients and caregivers actively undergoing cancer treatment on an outpatient basis. Patients must live at least 40 miles or one hour away from the treatment facility. Priority is given to patients needing three or more nights of lodging. Patients must be at least 18 years old (with some exceptions) and be independently mobile in the event of an emergency.

- Ohio Medicaid is a federal-state-funded program that provides health care coverage to a number of different groups of people who meet certain financial requirements. These groups include low-income children, some parents, pregnant women and aged, blind or disabled individuals.

- Medicare is a federal health insurance program. Eligible individuals include those who are 65 or older, people of any age with permanent kidney failure and disabled people under age 65. Medicare Part A pays for hospital, home health and hospice care and care in Medicare-certified nursing facilities. Medicare Part B covers medically necessary services including diagnostic studies, physician's services, durable home medical equipment and ambulance transportation along with some screening exams for cancer.

- Program is for patients in need of a life-saving bone marrow or cord blood cell transplant through the National Marrow Donor Program. This program helps patients pay for an unrelated search of the National

Bone Marrow registry and/or for some post-transplant costs.

- Provides financial assistance for life-saving or life-sustaining medications to uninsured or under-insured patients. Offers co-payment assistance for specific rare forms of cancer.

- Provides financially eligible patients access to long-distance medical air transportation for specialized medical evaluation, diagnosis or treatment facilities. Makes referrals to national charitable medical air transportation network.

- This is a nonprofit organization that assists people who are having difficulty affording medicine or with health care costs. This system is free, anonymous and web-based. System is similar to that of a Yellow Pages-type directory, helping people find assistance programs and resources in their area.

- The Partnership for Prescription Assistance helps match patients who lack prescription coverage and cannot afford medication to prescription programs that provide free or low-cost medications to eligible patients. Provides a single point of access to more than 475 public and private patient assistance programs. Assistance included for the uninsured.

- Offers financial assistance to patients having difficulty accessing treatment due to costs including deductibles, co-payments and co-insurance. Offers assistance for the following conditions: breast cancer, colorectal cancer, prostate cancer, cutaneous t-cell lymphoma, multiple myeloma, myelodysplastic syndrome, anemia, Non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, Non-small cell lung cancer, pancreatic cancer and oncology cytoprotection.

- Provides direct help to financially and medically eligible insured patients (including Medicare Part D beneficiaries) for pharmaceutical co-

payment assistance. Qualifying conditions include breast, lung, prostate, kidney, colon, pancreatic, head/neck cancers, malignant brain tumor, lymphoma, sarcoma, multiple myeloma, myelodysplastic syndrome (and other pre-leukemia diseases), selected autoimmune disorders and secondary issues as a result of chemotherapy treatment.

- Assists people who live with specific chronic health conditions to find appropriate health insurance coverage and access ways to satisfy expensive co-payments and premiums. Offers assistance for the following specific conditions: bone metastases, chronic myeloid leukemia, chronic myelocytic leukemia, cutaneous t-cell lymphoma and gastrointestinal stromal tumors.

- Provides low-cost or no-cost housing to families of seriously ill children who are receiving treatment at nearby hospitals. Families are asked to make a small donation for their stay (up to \$25 per day) when possible.

- Provides treatment and care to children with catastrophic illnesses. All children accepted for treatment at St. Jude are treated without regard to the family’s ability to pay.

- Provides monthly income for eligible elderly and disabled individuals. Administered by the Social Security Administration.

- Supplements Social Security payments for aged, blind and disabled people with little or no income. Provides cash to meet basic needs for food, clothing and shelter. Please check for eligibility requirements.

- Federal and state program that offers low-cost or no-cost health insurance coverage to uninsured infants, children and teens. Callers will be referred to the Ohio program to determine eligibility and minimum qualifications.

- Provides eligible veterans with treatment for service-connected injuries and other medical conditions. The VA has a cancer program designed to help veterans access information on cancer prevention, detection and treatment services.

Eligibility varies from program to program but typically, individuals must have incomes under 200% of the Federal Poverty Level, cannot have prescription coverage and must be a U.S. resident or citizen.
